

History of Robin Hood Inn

Following the article in our Summer newsletter, Roy Collinge has more information about the history of the Robin Hood Inn.

The Hinchliffe Legacy

On the 1775 map there are no buildings where the pub now stands. Prior to 1775 a Samuel Hinchliffe of Pudsey had married Mary Thomas, daughter of a well to do Sowerby farmer. Samuel set up as a maltster at Hawksclough , Mytholmroyd. Their son Richard, born in 1750, married Mary Sutcliffe of Midgley, and lived at Redacre, Mytholmroyd. In 1773 they moved to Castleton near Rochdale where Richard ran the Blue Pitts Inn. He inherited land and property from his maternal grandfather including land at Washfold, Turvin, in Cragg Vale to where he moved his family in 1785 and set up a primitive water wheel in the Turvin Brook which powered a spinning frame. He is believed to have produced the first mechanically spun thread in Cragg Vale.

Beginnings of the Pub

By 1802 Richard Hinchliffe was a successful mill owner and cotton manufacturer. An 1802 document shows he leased 600square yards of building land for 999 years from Mary Greenwood, widow of John Greenwood owner of Smithysteads Farm. The land, described as the northern corner of the Farm's lower field, is the site of the Robin Hood Inn and cottages. Having leased the land it is almost certain Richard had the buildings erected. However, inspection indicates they weren't all built at the same time. The first structure seems to be the one with the gable end at right angles to the road. The current pub's dining rooms, kitchen, community room, cellar and adjacent cottages are here. At a later date additional cottages were added higher up at the back, and a separate block of three cottages was built across the top. What is now the entrance to the pub, the bar with accommodation above, appears to have been built last. The toilet block with the flat roof came much later when Webster's brewery owned the pub.

Truck Shop

The original building was first used as a "Truck shop", run by Richard's son George until the time of his father's death in 1817. His sisters Fanny and Sarah moved into cottages at New Biggin (New Building) as the buildings at the Robin were called. In 1823 they kept a general provision, drapery and grocer's shop, presumably in the former truck shop.

The Robin Hood Inn

It is difficult to say exactly when the pub came into being, a sign says 'established 1834'. However a document indicates Richard's eldest son, Samuel Hinchliffe, was an innkeeper in 1825 and his will makes clear he was owner occupier of the Robin Hood Inn when he died in 1840. The pub part therefore may have been built 1820 to 1825. Initially it was probably one room where the bar is now, and much later expanded into the original building. Perhaps the pub operated for several years without a name and became established as The Robin Hood Inn in 1834.

From the national census, begun in 1841, we know that after Samuel Hinchliffe's death in 1840 his son Joseph became innkeeper, and was innkeeper in 1841,1851,and 1861. But by the 1871 census, there is a new innkeeper, George Halstead, 39, married to Margaret, 33. Joseph Hinchliffe had presumably retired as the census shows him living at Peter Row, Cragg Vale with his wife Hannah.


Purchase by a Brewery

In 1891 George Halstead is still the innkeeper, but around the turn of the century the Robin Hood Inn was purchased by Joseph Stocks, Shibden Head Brewery, Halifax. It's not known who they bought it from, whether the Hinchliffe family had retained ownership or if they had sold it to George Halstead. Some easements were granted to the brewery around this time in which the owner of 1,3,5 Robin Hood Cottages, Thomas Newall, gives permission for the pub to connect a drain from a new urinal to his drain. It begs the question how did customers relieve themselves previously! Another easement allows the brewery to put a window in the gable wall to give light into the bar area.



Edgar and Grace Haigh

In 1901 Stocks brewery installed Edgar Haigh, 25, as landlord of the pub, with his wife Grace, 25 and daughter Ethel. Interestingly Maggie Halstead, 5, also lives with them, perhaps a relative of George.


In 1905 a plan of the pub shows it comprises of all its current rooms, along with the cottages 2 and 4, so it would seem that Stocks Brewery purchased the entire property.

By the 1911 census, the landlord is George Sutcliffe, 28, his wife Mary Hannah, 30, sons Ernest 12, Hilton 10, daughters Eva 8, and Edith 6. The date of Wendy Chappell's photo (Summer newsletter) is around 1911 so the youngsters could be two of George's children, possibly the boy is Hilton, Wendy's grandfather. As for George, most of the men look older than 28, perhaps the chap on the far left looks most likely to be a landlord - a smart tie and shirt, and not wearing clogs.

The Newsletter article mentioned John and Betsy Nicholl's son Joseph who died in the first world war. A press cutting said at the time of his death they ran the Robin Hood Inn, I can't confirm this, but it's possible the Sutcliffes had left the pub and the Nicholl's had taken over. Finally, in 1932 Websters Brewery, Halifax, took over the business of Stocks Brewery and thus became the owners of The Robin Hood Inn.

Today the pub is back in private ownership once again, and saved for the local community, thanks to Elva, Roger, and Joanne Wood

The Craggs Country Business Park

High above the hills at the top of Cragg Vale, The Craggs Country Business Park opened its first phase in September 2011

The site, originally built as part of the Thornber Chicks business in the 1960's, was known locally as Turkey Lodge. Following the sale of most of the site to an animal feeds supply business in Shropshire; the main part fell into disrepair, with only a small number of buildings being retained within the wider Thornber family.

Initially used for farming pigs and cattle, more recently it developed into a successful range of business units, including the well known Little Valley Brewery. The remainder of the site became somewhat of an eyesore, with the main farm building and the 10 or so other buildings slowly, but surely, deteriorating as each year passed.

Having driven past the site each day for more than 10 years, Heidi and Chris Bingham decided to buy the derelict part of the site, and along with Heidi's parents, Ralph and June Thornber, formed The Craggs Country Business Park in April 2011.

With a determination to develop the site and bring the highest quality services to the local area, a team of local craftsmen have been kept busy renovating the various buildings and creating brand new locations for businesses as varied as an alpaca duvet manufacturing plant, a children's swimming pool, a personal storage business and a brand new brewery, Vocation. There are now some 25 businesses based here. Around 100 new, permanent, jobs have been created over the past 4 years alone – all the more impressive when you consider how challenging starting new businesses can be in the current climate.

The site was also the base for the first series BBC production of Happy Valley, and was the location of the Guinness World Record for a continuous length of bunting, achieved by the great and the good (and slightly mad) of Cragg Vale as part of the Tour de France celebrations.

The latest business to be welcomed to the site is 'The Craggies', a brand new Farm Shop with its own café and butcher's. Opened in mid-October, it is already proving to be a very popular stop for walkers, cyclists, and a large number of customers looking for a place to buy the very best quality, local farm produce and to have a fantastic piece of home-made cake at the same time!

Heidi commented, "We only have one or two smaller units left to rent, so when the weather allows next spring, the team will start work on the final two buildings and I hope these will be fully occupied by next summer. I'm very proud of what the team has built here so far, but I can't wait to see it completely finished next year.

Broadhead Clough – December 2015 update

After a warm, dry autumn the rain is now lashing down and all living creatures shelter from the wind and wet. Many have remained active when usually they've stocked up, migrated or hibernated already. Each year's breeding success starts with their autumn preparation and a winter plan to keep fit and healthy. Then they will win the best mate and secure prime territory in Spring. Here are ideas to help them and become a "hot spot" which they'll visit for the rest of the year.



- 1. Shelter Strike a balance when tidying up the garden or shed. Piles of logs and a few dusty plant pots in a corner create cover for many beetles, lacewings and millipedes or for tips on Bug Mansions and "hog homes" visit http://www.bbcwildlife.org.uk for an Ulster Wildlife Trust example.
- 2. Food leave seed heads and hedgerow berries and provide seed feeders, fat balls and mealworms to attract perch and ground feeding birds. Peanuts attract squirrels and badgers; meaty pet food for hedgehogs.
- 3. Helping hands Wild animals have to go out in bad weather but we can help them avoid wasting energy. If you start feeding then continue so the trek to your feeder is always rewarded. Make "access" holes in fences for hedgehogs to easily move round their habitats. If icy, chip holes so pond life can breathe or provide water for birds to drink and preen.

We have special winter tasks too, but depending on the weather finish early so nobody gets too cold or wet. As usual we meet at 10a.m. on the first Friday of the month but miss out New Year's Day: Dec 4th, Feb 3rd, and March 4th Best to ring beforehand to confirm if you want to join us.


