Broadhead Clough June 2019 update

Summer began early this year with the warm Easter kicking everything into growth early. As I write the bluebells both look their best and smell beautiful a couple of weeks earlier than usual. They're also springing up in new areas where clearing bracken or thinning trees has given them the light they need to flower.

The bilberry is also blooming in places where we've been bashing invasive bracken and there's hope for a good berry harvest in the summer. The reserve isn't really managed for flowers, but if enough light can reach through the canopy in small clearings or path margins they thrive: attracting woodland butterflies such as Ringlet and Speckled Wood.

Managing light and space is key to support a rich habitat with variety of species. Neglect can lead to domination and then monoculture (where only one type of plant is present). This is both monotonous to look at, but supports far fewer insects and mammals and is inherently "risky." If bad weather, pests or disease set in, the effects quickly spread to become decay, and then barren desolation.

Whether you like them or not dominant species are causing a problem for our native flowers and particularly Himalayan Balsam is spreading along the river system here in the Calder Valley. Yorkshire Wildlife Trust is now involved with Calderdale Council to improve the Copley Valley Green Corridor and Milner Royd nature reserve (between the Sowerby Bridge tip and Wakefield Road). They are starting work parties from 7th May continuing until 25th July usually on Thursdays and Fridays.

First will be a litter pick and then plenty of bashing Himalayan

Balsam aiming to create a rich grassland/wetland habitat by the canal and river. If you'd like to be in at the very start of "Re-wilding" these neglected local areas please phone me or contact peter.gurney@ywt.org.uk. Similar collaboration is being considered for future management of Brearley Fields. You can also sign up for #30DaysWild and challenge yourself with suggested activities every day in June to do something for wildlife.

Task-days here at Broadhead Clough are planned on the first Friday of the month at 10a.m. on June 7th, July 5th, Aug 2nd, and Sep 6th. All tools are provided, and gloves if required. Remember sun cream, insect repellent and bring a drink and packed lunch if you are staying all day.

BALLOON ASCENT & DESCENT

Taken from Todmorden & District News Friday 11th August 1899

On Monday evening considerable interest was aroused amongst the villagers owing to the appearance of a balloon passing over; the interest was intensified by reason of it lowering so rapidly that it was expected to alight close to the village.

However, it did not alight until it had reached a field at Firkin Farm, which is about two miles up the Cragg valley. The balloon was set up from Bowling Park gala, and was called the "Lord Masham". At seven o'clock Mr. Bramhall, his assistant, Mr. Dawson, and Mr J.H. Robson of Dalton, near Huddersfield, took their seats in the car. The last bag of ballast being taken aboard, the leading rope was thrown off, and the balloon ascended almost perpendicularly, without the slightest sign of uneven motion. It rose rapidly at first, and after some ballast had been thrown out it disappeared in the direction of Halifax.

PEOPLE WERE ASTONDED TO SEE WHAT SEEMED TO BE A MAN SHOOT THROUGH THE AIR

When at a considerable altitude the occupants of the car were seen to wave their hats, and immediately afterwards people were astounded to see what seemed to be a man shoot through the air. It turned out to be a parachute, with a dummy attached to it, which came in for a good deal of undeserved applause from the children as it descended with trembling limbs into an adjoining field.

Mr. Bramall expected to be back in Bradford, before ten o'clock, but as presently will be seen in these expectations he was entirely thrown out of his bearings. As already stated, the balloon alighted in a field at Firkin Farm. This was about a quarter to

eight, so that the journey from Bradford had been accomplished in forty-five minutes – a distance of about fifteen miles as the crow flies. The services of Mr. S. Bentley and his spring-cart were secured to take the balloon and the aeronauts to the railway station at Mytholmroyd.

THE AERONAUTS TO SAVE THEIR NECKS JUMPED OUT OF THE VEHICLE

After surmounting the difficulties of removing the balloon from the field in a zig-zag road to the main road, all went fairly well until Holderness had nearly been reached. At this point of the journey an accident occurred: one of the shafts of the vehicle broke causing the horse to bolt, and releasing itself from the vehicle it galloped down the road at a furious rate, and did not stop until it arrived at the door-way leading to the booking office at the station – where it had often been drawn up before but under different circumstances. It panted heavily and had most of the harness on but in a disorderly state. The horse was taken charge of by P. C. Glover, and it was put into a stable at the Shoulder of Mutton Inn until such time as Jehu arrived, which was not very long. To return to where the accident happened.

The aeronauts to save their necks jumped out of the vehicle; two of them did not sustain any injury, but Mr. Bramhall had his left arm injured, but not too seriously. Other means of transit had to be secured, and ultimately the trio of aeronauts and the balloon were brought to the station in a cart.

In a conversation which our representative had with the aeronauts, he learned that the voyage had been of a pleasant description. Mr. Bramhall stated that he had made about fifty ascents,

whilst his assistant, Mr. Dawson, had been in cloud-land about double that number of times.

As for Mr. Robson, it was the first time out, and he had been greatly pleased, and said he would not mind if he was going to have another ascent on the following day; he should very much prefer it to having a ride in a spring-cart, such as he had that evening. Ultimately the balloonists and their balloon, &c., left the station for home by belated trains.
