Phonics at the Ark



In Pre-School at The Ark we have lots of fun building the foundation skills necessary for reading. We foster a love of books through story sessions using role play, props and puppets. The children also love visiting our extensive library. We use the 'Letters and Sounds' programme along with a wide selection of other resources and provide many different activities and games for the children to explore the different aspects within Phase 1. We also begin to look at individual letter sounds to extend learning, once children are ready. We make a priority of fine tuning the children's 'listening ears' to identify and distinguish between a variety of sounds around them. Our children enjoy using instruments and

their voices to accompany rhyming activities. We encourage children to create their own rhythms and songs to accompany stories or characters and love seeing the delight this brings.

We are so lucky to have such a wonderful space in which to investigate sounds. The children enjoy taking 'Listening Walks' through the beautiful countryside to talk about the similarities and differences of the sounds they hear. Children compare and contrast the sounds of sheep and cows in the fields nearby to the many different types of birdsongs they hear down on their weekly Forest School sessions.

The Group meets each month for a get-together of songsters and musicians, to make new friends and try out a wide range of songs in a very informal setting. 

NEW CRAGG HALL

The 100 year anniversary of the fire that burnt down the mansion known as New Cragg Hall, is not far away. New Cragg hall, home of the Hinchliffe mill-owning family in Cragg Vale, was destroyed by fire on the 11th August 1921.

The local history group is hoping to mark the event next year by holding an exhibition, and providing an historical overview of how the Hinchliffe family built up the Cragg Hall estate and gardens over several decades. Much research will be needed to piece together the story of New Cragg Hall. The history group is anxious to hear from anyone who has any information, photographs or documents relating to life and times in Cragg Vale 100years ago. Perhaps your relatives worked in the Hinchliffe's mills, or even in the Hall itself. Did you play in the ruins as a child? We would be very interested to hear your stories.

The Bread and Butter Sandwich Company is one of the newest tenants at Topland. Owned by Liam Garvey, a former Calder High student who has coffee shops (including 'Coffee Cali') in Hebden Bridge and Huddersfield.

The aim is to use good quality, local produce to make 'handcrafted' sandwiches. Liam said "I found the lack of good quality options amongst the conveyor belt, pre-packed sandwiches very frustrating so I decided to set up my own business here at Topland". Liam's first job at Coffee Cali, set up in 1998 by his Mum who retired 5 years ago, was making sandwiches so he says he has "come full loop" with this new venture – and there is also another important local loop, the fruit and vegetables will be coming from 'Valley Veg' owned by Cragg Vale lad Liam Laprell.

The Bread and Butter Sandwich Company, starting with 4 employees, hopes to deliver to other independent coffee shops in the area as well local schools and colleges. Topland's tenants and employees will also be able to benefit from this new business as they will be able to buy coffee, tea, and sandwiches via the coffee shop at the front of the premises.



Liam says "the environment surrounding Topland is so beautiful it's important to me to make sure we protect it, so our food will be custom-made to order and delivered the next day to cut out waste and we'll be plastic-free with bamboo cups and wrappings that compost in 60days". His business premises are also very beautiful with fruit and veg painted on the wall by his mother-in-law, Melinda Joy Chantler, who is a local artist. Liam's final comment: "Coming to work here every day is a real pleasure!"

Broadhead Clough December 2019 update

It's been the wettest October we've recorded here for over 20 years with very few sunny days of autumn colour and the leaves shedding much later en-masse.

It's a common saying that "you can't see the wood for the trees," meaning that the details get in the way of the bigger picture. This autumn we've literally had to focus on two of the more significant trees, because the wet weather has loosened the soil holding their roots, and caused them to lean, creating a risk on the path. The first near the entrance was a willow and

removing it has revealed a clearing with several young hazels that in future could become an interesting and beautiful coppicing glade. The other, I will particularly miss: a silver birch, not ancient or particularly handsome, but a tree with attitude. It stood in the middle of the path at one of the steepest points forcing you to decide which side to take.

The upper was via a step using its exposed roots as a staircase; or the lower, on a bilberry slope. I'd often used its trunk to pull up on, or hold for balance descending in snowy weather. I watched sadly as it had to be felled in case it fell along the path.

Now there's a new view over its stump, ironically heart shaped, and a large habitat log pile on the slope below. Nature is always in a state of change, whether momentous for large trees or the familiar gentle decay as fungi work in the leaf litter to return nutrients to the soil. Whilst working we've spotted "amethyst deceiver" and various oak bracket fungi in the wood and the Halifax Scientific Society did a survey on the meadows, including Waxcap and Fairy Clubs.

Winter task-days start at 10a.m. on Dec 6th, Jan 3rd, Feb 7th, and March 6th, but depending on the weather finish early so nobody gets too cold or wet. Best to ring beforehand to confirm it's on if you want to join us.
