

This kind of play is wonderfully simple: you offer a selection of safe, everyday items - especially natural materials - and let your baby lead the way. It's amazing to see how long even the smallest explorers can stay fascinated when they have something truly interesting to investigate.




#### What goes in the treasure basket?


- Wooden treasures spoons, egg cups, chunky bangles, smooth blocks, or curtain rings (metal removed).
- Metal mysteries a shiny teaspoon, a tea strainer, small bowls, or a little tin that makes a satisfying "ting!" when tapped.
- Textural treats a furry swatch, a silky square, a loofah, or a pebble that's cool and smooth to the touch.
- Unexpected curiosities a make-up mirror, a CD or anything else that's safe and intriguing.

Place them all in a low basket - no lid, no fuss - so your baby can reach in and choose what calls to them. You'll see tiny fingers exploring textures, little hands experimenting with weight, and curious eyes studying reflections.

Before each play session, check that every item is big enough not to be swallowed, strong enough to withstand a tug, and smooth enough to be gentle on gums. Give the edges a quick feel and retire anything that's chipped, frayed, or past its prime.

This freedom builds their confidence, helps them focus for longer, and turns everyday objects into the most exciting toys in the world. So, go ahead - fill that basket, place it within reach, and settle in for the show. You'll be amazed at how much learning fits inside one little basket of treasures.





# CRAGG CHALLENGE 2025 LONGEST HILL ON THE LONGEST SUNDAY



Sunday 22nd June saw the return of 'the longest hill on the longest Sunday' to Cragg Vale. Highlights included 'Chainsaw Guy' in the cycle ascent and a couple of buggies racing in the 5K. Nice to see some alternative takes on the events!

The day started with the Cragg 35 Sportive cycling event with even more entries for its second year. This was followed by the 'Oliver Collinge Climb' (school relay) with entrants from local primary schools and Calder High being joined by a new cohort from Warley Town School. A great effort, with some of the older students running legs of over 1Km (and against a vicious headwind), and they still achieved a time of 36m 25s, an impressive 3 seconds faster than last year!

Once again, we had good numbers of spectators out along the route to cheer on the participants which really makes a difference to the people taking part.

Our fundraising for charity, Overgate Hospice and Cancer Research UK, this year, through work at the Start/Finish, a sponsored Cycle Ascent and via our JustGiving pages is running at over £1000 and still receiving donations after the event! While one runner sponsored for the 10-mile has raised approximately £1400 for Cancer Research UK.





### LISTER LANE CEMETERY HALIFAX

Each year, a visit to a "place of interest" is arranged. Last year, June 2024, the group visited the restored Rochdale Town Hall. This year, June 2025, the visit was to the Lister Lane Cemetery in Halifax. The cemetery first opened in 1841 as the Halifax General Cemetery. However, by 1963, the site was full and so had to be closed to any further burials. Consequently, it went through a period of neglect and abandonment until, in 1999, "The Friends of Lister Lane Cemetery" charity was formed and, in collaboration with Calderdale Metropolitan Borough Council, the volunteers set to promote the upkeep and public profile of the site. In 2015, the Cemetery was awarded a Significant Cemetery in Europe status by the Association of Significant Cemeteries in Europe.

The cemetery covers three acres of land, laid out around a neo-classical chapel (now derelict) and a raised terrace with views across Halifax to Beacon Hill. It is Grade II listed in Historic England's 'Register of Historic Parks and Gardens of special historic interest in England', and has many interesting monuments, particularly the gothic spires and obelisks along the main pathway.



Its memorials provide an index of many people who shaped the development of Halifax during its period of spectacular growth in the 19th century, a period which defined the way the town still looks today. The grave stones were cut from a local quarry in Elland and that, together with the site seeming to have its own little micro climate, has resulted in the stones remaining in very good

condition. Some of the graves are 20 deep and unfortunately some are now sinking. The Friends of Lister Lane have researched every person buried in the Cemetery and there are several information boards in the site giving the fascinating stories about their lives, with more available on the "Friends" website, www.listerlanecemetery.co.uk.

The patron of the Cemetery is The Rt Hon Hugh Crossley, 4th Baron Somerleyton. Many of the Crossley family are buried in the Cemetery including John, Francis and Joseph. Their family house is across the road from the Cemetery, Belle Vue Mansion, which in the 1970's was the home of Halifax Library. It is now privately owned and used as a party/wedding venue catering for up to 600 guests.

### AND A LINK WITH CRAGG VALE...

As you enter the Cemetery from Lister Lane entrance, on the left is the site of the old cemetery lodge where 6 year old Mary Hackett and her family had lived. The family had moved to Halifax from Limerick, Ireland, in search of a better life. On the 12th August 1952, Mary disappeared whilst playing outside her home. Her body was found 6 weeks later at Park Congregational Church, a mere 150 yards across the road from her home. Albert "Bert" George Hall, the caretaker at the Church was arrested for the murder. Bert was married and had only recently moved from Cragg Vale to take up this post. He pleaded not guilty to the murder, but, after a trial of only 4 days at Leeds Assizes, he was convicted. Incidentally, he was the last local man to hang at Armley Jail, on 22nd April 1954. One last detail about this incident. In 1972, a man walked into Hull Police Station and confessed to the murder. Scotland Yard looked into the matter. However, Bert's conviction was upheld.

### THE VISIT - JUNE 2025

It was a balmy summer evening with temperatures in the low 20s, when the party from the history group arrived for the visit. The group would like to thank "The Friends" for arranging this special visit for us, and in particular our tour guides, David Glover and Stuart Wilkinson, for a most interesting and knowledgeable tour. Normally the Cemetery is kept locked due to previous vandalism. However, it is open to the public on certain days – the next one being Sunday 21st September as part of Heritage Week in Halifax.





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# BROADHEAD CLOUGH SEPTEMBER 2025 UPDATE



What a difference a year makes! The sunny spring and bright sunshine has been good news for most of our wildlife. When we returned home from holiday what a surprise to find our companion planting of nasturtiums in the veg beds doing exactly the job we wanted. Their leaves were covered in caterpillars (probably of the large "cabbage white" butterfly).



A wasps' nest had appeared under the garden shed's roof. It can be easily avoided, so we're letting them stay put. The blue tits had an abundance of caterpillars, and it was fantastic to see their number of family groups return to previous levels.

The task day fell on August 1st, Yorkshire Day, and it was eerily quiet in the wood. In 3 hours I heard one nuthatch, a few wrens and saw a jay flit through the trees. Where were the birds?... skulking out of sight to moult!

Over time, feathers (made of keratin similar to our nails), get damaged or wear out, and must be shed. They are then replaced to keep out the winter weather, or to be in the best possible condition for migration. You'll see some very shabby looking robins and blackbirds, who are usually the first to moult in July.



Blue tits wait until August, after their final brood has fledged, and hide away in the trees. Willow warblers are unusual in that they moult before each long journey, from, and to, Africa. They shed feathers twice in a year. During the average 4-8 week moult, birds can't fly well, and are at greater risk of predators. Hiding in hedges or thicker vegetation whilst staying silent is the best survival plan!

If you want to volunteer at the reserve, we'd love to meet you at the entrance signboard at 10a.m. on Sept 5th, Oct 3rd, and Nov 7th. Bring food and drink for the time you intend to volunteer. We usually work until 3pm. All tools are provided, including thick gloves.
